The book of Judges gives a picture of Israel’s downward spiral after the death of Joshua. Because God’s people failed to completely drive out the inhabitants of Canaan as the Lord had instructed, they soon merged with the idolatrous practices of the land and fell prey to their enemies (see Judges 2:10-15).

Still the Lord in His mercy “raised up judges to rescue the Israelites from their attackers... Whenever the LORD raised up a judge over Israel, He was with that judge and rescued the people from their enemies throughout the judge’s lifetime... But when the judge died, the people returned to their corrupt ways, behaving worse than those who had lived before them. They went after other gods, serving and worshiping them. And they refused to give up their evil practices and stubborn ways” (Judges 2:16, 18a, 19).

Deborah was a judge the Lord raised up. “She would sit under the Palm of Deborah, between Ramah and Bethel in the hill country of Ephraim, and the Israelites would go to her for judgment” (Judges 4:5).
